





Indoor Plein Air


Bernard Fallon will lead a free indoor plein air event, not outdoors, but indoors amid the contemporary artworks and installations.

You must bring your own drop cloth.







Pyre

The loss of a loved one shatters life as we know it. Flora Kao's solo installation Pyre features footage of the ritual burning of origami lotus during her grandfather's funeral rites in Taiwan. Accompanied by the sutra chants of Buddhist nuns, projections of fiery flower offerings consume an oversize paper lotus. The lotus in flames is a symbol of cathartic transformation. Pyre asks how do we heal after catastrophic loss? How do we move beyond the abyss of grief?

Bearing Witness is an installation honoring refugees. This year, because of climate change, disasters, and violence, 100 million people around the world are torn from their homes, more than at any time in modern history. I want visitors to feel an intimate sense of their individual lives. The life-size "Witness" figures and the drawings in the wall-hangings invite viewers to lean in close to the faces that are the same size as their own. The panels use charcoal, coffee bean bags, rusted wires, and found objects on raw linen. The sculpted heads of the Witnesses are clay, molding paste and bronze surfaces. The bodies use burlap and re-purposed materials for cloaks that suggest ancient wisdom. Their eyes made of mirrors cue the visitor to witness themselves; that is, to become one of the participants in attesting to history. Now more than ever, we need a space for shared humanity.






No Other Peggy Sivert

No Other refers to our use of the idea of Alterity – the awareness of the Other. It is my objective to present the mass of various colors – including those of our humanity and environment - to combine them into an amalgamation, taking on a presence of One – no Other.

The development of "No Other" began with my seeking out an appropriate material that could easily be internationally transported and used to create a large-scale art installation in Korea. I would need a material that was plentiful, sustainable, and available. It would require minimal mass or weight, encompass art elements (line, shape, space, value, form, texture, and color) and be castoff and free.


My material was unexpectedly delivered to me in a big bundle of colorful baling twine from the generous equestrian community of Portuguese Bend. The hay that they feed their horses is bound by this twine, a never-ending source of colorful media! Strong enough to compact a 100 lb. bale of hay, this twine carries with it the history of our world before we entered the industrial age, adding another layer of meaning to the installation.


Organizing the 8 ft long strands, I began to see the vertical visual of heavy rain. Continuing, I divided the strands into color groupings which seem to reference human form with associated race and color. I spent many weeks working with this lightweight, colorful material, exploring its material characteristics and potential for content and subject matter. Past, present, and future perspectives of color relationships are expressed through draping, weaving, knotting, braiding, twisting, bundling, tangling, etc. to create a 3D form. Alfred Skondovitch 1927 – 2011

"I produce my art because I have to, the way other people breathe. I have worked since childhood. In order to express myself I must get the ideas in my head on paper or canvas. My life is my art, just as my family is my life. I feel you are influenced by others in your art and you also influence others—it is this cauldron that makes the artist."

Alfred Skondovitch

Skondovitch was born in London in 1927 to Russian Jewish Immigrant parents. At 12 years old, he was one of many children evacuated from London and sent to live with families in the countryside for safety.

At the end of the war, he felt the need to help those most affected, and at 18 years old he joined a youth group to bring aid to thousands of people newly liberated from the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in Germany.

"He just saw horrors that seared in his mind forever. The group was met with piles of unburied dead bodies and thousands of survivors barely able to walk or talk. These memories of scenes witnessed first-hand, haunted Alfred throughout his life.

Skondovitch's family feels it is important that these painting be seen by as many as possible to serve as a reminder of the horrors resulting from unchecked intolerance."



But are we asking that question? Or are we just living with it, making our children


live with it? Is America making a deal with the devil establishing safety protocols







I use vibrant cloth to create an alternate universe, and the resulting work is whimsical, edgy, mundane, surreal, and engaging, all at once. My work has developed in tandem with the art quilt movement, but I am one of the few artists making figurative sculpture--often incorporating sound, light, and movement--from this medium. The power and beauty of the collaged and quilted surface play off the form and narrative content of the work, resulting in a dynamic seesaw of meanings and possibilities. Each piece tells a story, but the narrative is always open to interpretation.

I often describe my work as "stealth art": the comfortable ambiance of sewn cloth draws viewers in, where they can muse on the paradoxes of contemporary life. I am interested in our daily routines and objects of daily use, and my best work conflates conflicting human impulses into a single image.


These images are from a new series of hand embroidered photographs taking the city of Venice as subject. At one time, the most prosperous and populated city in Europe, it is today a city where tourists outnumber residents and is particularly challenged by rising sea levels. The images are interrupted and recreated through hand embroidery based on patterns of Venetian lace, once one of the city's most coveted exports, but now primarily made by machine. The delicacy of lace and the interruption of the image symbolizes the city's vulnerability to contemporary threats like climate change and damage created by excessive tourism as well as its resilience through time. While the photographs in this series are of Venice and the patterns of Venetian lace are a literal and metaphorical reference to the history of the city, the project intends to serve a more general statement on the changing nature of a place.

Disrupto Manifesto: Vestiges Christine Mazanec

A three dimensional, life size installation of wood, leather, metal, text and the accoutrements of my life experience. A personal journey of experiencing compartmentalization within society and the veneer I have adopted as a result in my process. My superpower is my differentness creatively challenging imposed norms that I perceive have historically suppressed my individuality. The mannequin itself carries the weight of my emotion and experience through surface words and rantings, scratched onto the form as my internal monologues, conflicted recollections and reflections. Within the wooden vest of drawers are secrets, thoughts, ideas, wishes, and memories as protective anthropomorphic armor, representing the dichotomy between what lies on the surface and the suppressed fears, prejudices, biases of my experience. The distressed wooden vest of drawers is meant to protectively hold "otherness" close. This piece is an homage to Salvador Dali's 1936 "Chest of Drawers" and his 1965 "Drawers of Memory" which explored the surreal vestiges of the human psyche. Dali transformed the ordinary into the extraordinary through the functionality in a surreal dance of remembrance, mysteries of the mind and imagination.






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

















The Improv Taiko is a group dedicated to preserving the art of Japanese taiko drumming in the community.
